Ohhhh The thought of summer and sunny day drives roll on!!

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
CLUB NEWSFLASH





AN UNEXPECTED ACQUISITION!

I advertised a quite rusty 1968 Steyr Puch Haflinger and after a few days I was contacted by a gentleman from Mona Vale in New South Wales who imports the Royal Alloy Motor Scooters. At that stage he had seven individual scooters in the warehouse and 18 motor Scooters and sidecars.



Shipping was upset for several reasons and he took two overdue deliveries of the scooters at the start of winter. As you know in the winter months, it's not really appealing to think about buying a motor scooter to ride in the cold and wet. He wanted the Haflinger and offered me a new motor scooter which I rejected pointing out I would probably fall off it as even my cars have a minimum of three wheels!lol.

He persisted and started offering me three wheels as well with a motor scooter and sidecar, being as I have another two Haflingers I thought it would be fun to have a pretty combination of a motor scooter and sidecar, so arrangements were made to take the Haflinger to NSW and return with the fully crated motor scooter and sidecar.

It is now registered and is great fun. Ironically his biggest market is for the carrying of dogs, either being taken to a park or the beach for their daily walk.

I attach one more picture that is more conducive to a historical vehicle, this is a 1976 Rover P6B after a

two year restoration that we purchased and have collected today.



This also has a story because on the 16th of August 1975 or 49 years ago when Doreen and I got married, we had my white Rover and a friend's white Rover as our wedding cars and the car we purchased would possibly have been manufactured in 1975 and sent to New Zealand in knock down form for assembly for the Australian market as this car was the last year of production and was complied in Australia in April 1976, so it looks like we started our married life with a white Rover and will cherish having another one nearly half a century later.

MOORABBIN AIR MUSEUM AND THE NAKED RACER CAFE

Our end of month run for August was to The National Aviation Museum in Moorabbin, followed by lunch at the The Naked Racer Cafe. Members met at the Baxter Tavern where we set off for the 30 minute drive to Moorabbin. Due to the horrific wind and rain predictions most members chose to come in modern cars and leave their oldies tucked up in the garage. I know I was doubtful if my 48 year old windscreen wipers would cope with the predicted downpour!

We were lucky the weatherman got it wrong again, and the day turned out to be sunny, although extremely windy. Some members chose to skip the museum and met us at the café for lunch.

For those of us that had never been to the Museum, it was very interesting and informative. Although we had not booked in for a personal tour, the guide was available as had no other groups booked, so offered to give us a guided tour. We certainly heard about many historical events that we would have not otherwise have known about!

The Australian Aircraft Restoration Group was formed in 1962 as a volunteer group by members of the Aviation Historical Society of Australia, who undertook to recover and preserve a DAP Beaufighter under threat of scrapping after years of use at the Children's Camp at Portsea. Following the donation and recovery of the Beau-fighter in April, a Wackett Trainer was purchased, followed by the oldest complete aircraft in the collection, a DH60G Gypsy Moth.

1963 was a busy year for the group, in January they bought an Avro Anson from Flinders Island Airlines, and in May bought a Meteor from the Department of Supply. TAA donated a Tiger Moth in mid-1963, and the year was rounded out by purchasing a Wirraway from CAC. Early in 1964, most of the collection was moved to a service station north of Lilydale, where the Gypsy Moth and Wackett were put on display. Later in the year many of the aircraft were taken to a market garden adjacent to Moorabbin Airport.











In October 1964, a Proctor was donated, and by this stage the Department of Civil Aviation had agreed to lease the group land at Moorabbin Airport, with a fence erected on May 20th 1965. In 1966, the AARG returned for another look at the farming district near Colac and collected a Kittyhawk fuselage, while February 1967 saw the most spectacular arrival when a Fairey Firefly was flown from Bankstown to Moorabbin.

The next stage in the Museum's development took place in July 1967 when the re-fencing of the site resulted in a total area of 300 feet by 140 feet. At this stage the AARG was just five years old.

For the next 20 years the Museum grew as more and more aircraft came into the collection and the theme of the Museum was quickly established. An aircraft or artefact acquired by the Museum had to be relevant to Australian aviation history. Without realizing it the Museum was establishing what would be labelled by museum professionals years later as a collection policy. This theme is what held the Museum collection together and provided a sense of purpose to the collection. Other aviation museums would form in Australia but none would acquire the vast range of aircraft types, all of which related directly to Australian history. The collection ranges from gliders and home-builts to World War 2 combat aircraft, jet fighters, crop dusters and four engine airliners.





By the early 1980's the aircraft collection had grown to a very impressive 30 machines but another very hard lesson had been learned. Collecting aircraft, restoring them and displaying them was not enough. At this time the Museum was still an open air display and the effects of the weather were beginning to play havoc with the aircraft. No matter how robustly constructed an aircraft may be, if it is left exposed to the elements it will eventually succumb.

During the 1970's and '80's there had been various proposals put forward by government

and private groups to fund a National Aviation Museum in Victoria. The Moorabbin Air Museum was involved in many of these deliberations, but by the late 1980's it had become apparent that none of these schemes would reach fruition. The Museum directors realized that the only way to ensure the long term survival of the aircraft was to take action themselves and in 1988 all surplus assets of the museum were sold in order to provide funds to erect an 8,000 sq ft hangar on the Museum site. In April 1989 that hangar was completed and three years later it was extended to 12,000 sq ft. In the intervening years a library, workshop and store were also erected together with an entry building and shop.

Over the years the Moorabbin Air Museum has been recognized by a number of awards, the most prestigious of which was a Certificate of Merit in the 1985 Museum of the Year Awards. Apart from the preservation of aircraft, the Museum's other great accomplishment has been the number of young members who have gone on to careers in aviation or museology; the experience gained while at the Museum standing them

in good stead in their working lives.

To many it would seem that the Museum has accomplished its goals, but in truth it has barely begun. Between 1980 and 2000 the aircraft collection increased by an average of one airframe per year. The collection now totals 52 machines and that makes the Museum the largest aircraft owner on Moorabbin Airport. It is an aeronautical collection larger than half the world's airlines and a third of the world's air forces and only one third of it is displayed under cover. The rest is in storage, on loan, under restoration or, at worst, on display in the open air.







Today the Moorabbin Air Museum, now attracts visitors from all over the world. Each year busloads of wide eyed school children come to learn about the magic of flight and Australia's part in the development of aviation. All of this started with a vague idea, a determination largely borne in ignorance of the enormous difficulties that would present themselves and most importantly the museum members, past and present, who could not bear to stand and watch the great planes die. The Museum is available to host Childrens and Adults Birthday Parties, Club and other events such as Photo Shoots & Filming.



The collection at Moorabbin Air Museum is one of the largest and most varied in Australia. The collection is based around Aircraft Manufactured or Built in Australia, primarily by the Department of Aircraft Production, Commonwealth Aircraft Corporation and the Government Aircraft Factory.

With the acquisition of the Kiowa Helicopter A17-055 in 2017, the Museum now holds the only complete collection of aircraft manufactured by these companies in Australia.

Due to the availability of space within the Museum's display area and the condition of some of assets not all are on display at the Museum. In some instances the aircraft are on loan to other museums around Australia. Restoration projects are limited by space & funding.

In the Future, the Australian Aircraft Restoration Group have plans to move to a larger permanent location so that we are able to move forward restoring many of the air frames awaiting restoration and also to bring the restored aircraft and engines currently out on loan home.

A most enjoyable tour followed by a well deserved lunch at The Naked Racer, which is very popular amongst our members. The collection of memorabilia at the Naked Racer is always so interesting to explore.



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WE ALL REMEMBER OUR 1ST CAR! THE EXCITEMENT AND THRILL OF THOSE FIRST TRIPS TO PICK UP YOUR FRIENDS!

Here is my story on my First Car: A 1957 Holden FE sedan, which I still own since 1968. FE FE 57. My First Car (aka"Fifi")

Part 1 GUESS WHO??

I was 16 years old and recall this great experience as if it was last year. It was 1968. My Mum & Dad's workshop was a "Total" (French) brand Servo on the corner of Nepean Highway and Wimborne Av in Chelsea. As Dad was a Roadworthy Inspector and inspected cars every day, it was an opportune day that a 5 pm inspection took place in my presence, (as I would go from school straight to the workshop to help out, so Dad could go home early and get some rest, as he would open at 6 am , 7 days x wk).

The owner of this 1957 Holden FE had reported crazy quotes from other inspections and came on recommendation of another client due to Dads fairness in quotes costings. Dad was cheaper than all the others, but the client was in such financial stress, he chose to not go ahead with repairs, and to take the FE away for "unknown" avenues of disposal. "My God!" I thought, as if it was one of many animals I had rescued; facing a fate worse than a miserable death! I tugged on Dads overalls and whispered in no uncertain terms, my desire to own this beautiful car! (in my eyes). Roadworthy Inspection fee was \$7 from memory (\$250-500 today!) and the owner said he'd be happy with \$20-7=\$13! Papers were signed. Wow! I thought I'd just won Tatts!





I immediately set about scrubbing and cleaning that car inside and out, underneath and within, till my hands were bleeding, and the car looked like new! (to me at least!) Now for the best bit: Engine out for overhaul!

One of the RWC faults was smoke and expensive oil leaks: Big Job! Dad would show me how to overhaul the entire engine, as time allowed, in between his booked-in clients. Every spare moment under Dads supervision, I would sand and rub those panels what seemed forever, in preparation for painting; inside and out! I wanted the paint to be bright Orange, but was convinced by those who knew better, that would be asking for trouble, as every hoon in town went for that colour! I settled for a subtle bright Green, and so glad I did.

As soon as I got my licence from Sgt Alex Moon

at Mordialloc Police (next to Pompei Boat Shed), I went to Acland Street St Kilda (no, not that!!!) where I had the front bench seat "articulated", which allowed the front and rear seat to couple together to form a double bed! Wow! I was in heaven!


