Graham's Truck Featured

Members may be familiar with Graham Baldock' beautifully restored 1928 Chevrolet 1 ton truck, which has graced Club events since 2011. Graham's restoration of the vehicle was reported in the January/February edition of *Vintage Trucks & Commercials* magazine, and subsequently in the *Winged Arrow*, the Skoda & Tatra Register newsletter. It is reproduced here with permission.



My 1928 Chev truck, .Model LP, with a 4-cylinder OHV, running 21.7hp, has a local history, and some may remember it as the truck used by B. Martin & Sons timber yard, where it was used for carting and delivering timber

throughout Geelong and surrounding areas, from their premises located in Ryrie Street, Geelong, VIC. The truck is part of Geelong's heritage, as Martin's was established in 1861 and remained in the same family until its closure in 1954. Before acquiring the truck, the firm used a horse drawn dray to make deliveries.

Mr Bill Stephenson was the only employee to drive the 1vehicle and it is said that "he treated it like a baby".

Following the closure of the yard, the truck was moved on to another timber yard, where it was not afforded the same 'kid glove' treatment - due to the non-existence of forklift machinery, workers used the Chev to ram stacks of timber and dislodge them. However, fortuitously, despite this rough treatment, it was never known to have broken down, or stopped working.

The Chev came into my possession in mid-2003, when I



purchased it from a friend, and though in poor condition and in need of total restoration, it was near complete. I had the motor stripped down and fully reconditioned, then set about doing the rest, which I would have found to be a much harder task without a great deal of invaluable help and advice from my friends and fellow members of the Western

District Historic Vehicle Club.

After re-building the cabin and tray, panel beating, and painting (using a very steady hand and some gold leaf), the upholstery was the final task to be done. I did this myself, using a light-industrial sewing machine.





The full restoration was completed in May 2011, and put on club plates, and is now one of my prized possessions.

At a comfortable travelling speed of 40mph, (65kph), I won't be breaking any land-speed records, or driving any long distances, but I do enjoy taking it out on a run every now and then. Please note the club

plate in the photo isn't the correct plate for a vintage vehiclethis one was mistakenly issued by the authorities at the time, and was rectified on the renewal. Twelve months later. It now correctly sports 6•283 on the rear. * Graham Baldock

Stories From the Shed

From the Sublime to the Ridiculous





Please find attached a few photos from Rob Roy Revival of Darren Visson's recent reconstruction of a replica of Eldred Norman 1945 (approx.) race car. This vehicle used a truck chassis and running gear, wheels and tyres. The engine was two side valve Ford V8's fitted end to end to form a V16.

The brake drums were cooled by four electric fuel pumps spraying water on each brake drum.

His lunch, consisting of a tin of baked beans or spaghetti, was

wired to the exhaust manifold. This was eaten after practice or a race, ensuring that he could have a hot dinner.

Dave told me Eldred drove from his home city of Perth to Fisherman's Bend airfield racetrack, where he raced it. I witnessed this race myself. Then two days later he drove to the Rob Roy Hill climb, where he recorded a very fast time. Eldred then drove the car back to Perth. The road at that period of history was an unmade, rutted track.

Eldred later went on to build a very advanced race car using a Ford Zephyr engine on its side with Holden front suspension bolted to the front of the engine and a short connection to the back axle. It had virtually no chassis and was miles ahead of its time.


Eldred's wife, Nancy Cato, was the author of the book "All the Rivers Run".

Darren drives his three cylinder Suzuki-engined race car at Rob Roy. It is about 450 to 500 mm in height and often records the fastest time of the day – about 25 seconds. Darren also has a land speed record for a tractor, with an Australian built Chamberlain recording 56 mph. – John Hickford

Eldred De Bracton Norman (9 January 1914 – 28 June 1971) was an Australian inventor and racing-car driver. Norman was born in Adelaide, the second of six children and attended Scotch College, Adelaide. On 15 May 1941 Norman married Nancy Cato, then a 24-year-old journalist.

Eldred was notably famous for producing sliding vane superchargers. The rare and iconic supercharger started as a base model, the Type 65, and is highly sought after in the early Holden community. The Type 65 was a bolt on, performance enhancing

product to suit the Holden Grey motor.

How much carbon does your vehicle emit?

There is a lot of discussion about global warming, greenhouse gases and the need to reduce carbon dioxide. There will be increasing pressure to reduce fossil fuel (hydrocarbon) usage as this is a major producer of carbon dioxide (CO2).

If we are to preserve Australia's cultural heritage in operating condition and continue the social and economic benefits that flow from this, we will need to eliminate or offset our carbon emissions.

Operating Heritage Australia supports a three-step approach to minimising carbon emissions from historic machinery:

- minimise the use of fossil fuels in all aspects of daily life
- use renewable fuels where appropriate.
- where no alternative is available, offset emissions by supporting projects that consume more carbon dioxide than we produce.

We need your support to inform decisionmakers and the general public that our contribution to climate change is tiny and that we are working to eliminate, through renewable fuels or offsets even that tiny amount.

First, start by understanding the size of the problem – how much carbon dioxide does your historic vehicle actually emit each year?

Find where your vehicle's fuel consumption intersects with its km/year to find CO2 in kg.

For example, on average, Australian historic cars (based on the latest FIVA survey) travel around 1200 km/yr and if we assume a 14L/100km (20mpg) fuel consumption, then the amount of carbon dioxide produced is 504kg for the year.

As a comparison:

- ◆ A human breathes out around 240kg CO2 per year
- A medium-sized dog produces (breathing and food) 700-800kg CO2 per year
- A typical electric car driving 10,000 km per year and charged from the grid produces around 1150kg

In 2023 the majority of historic motor vehicles could have their total carbon emissions offset through ethical revegetation schemes for under \$20 per year.

Some other information:

The total amount of petroleum fuels used each year by the 500,000 owners of historic vehicles accounts for around 0.05% of Australia's total petroleumbased fuel consumption. There is no viable alternative available at this time.

The average electric vehicle will produce less carbon per kilometre than an internal combustion vehicle – around half that of a modern vehicle and around a quarter that of an historic vehicle (and less if charged by solar or wind).

Any new vehicle (electric or internal combustion) will produce carbon dioxide during its construction (materials, assembly and transport). According to the International Energy Agency, manufacturing a mid-sized internal combustion vehicle will produce around 6t CO2 and a similar electric vehicle around 8-10t depending on the type and size of battery. This means that it if you replace your historic vehicle with any new vehicle, it could take around 20 years before you have saved the carbon used to manufacture the new vehicle.

OHA will try to keep you up-to-date in this rapidly changing area of alternative energy sources for motor vehicles. If you have any questions, please contact your local association/AHMF/whatever.



Letters to the Editor

The rule book for the speed limit on highways changes the speed limit from 100km/h to 80km/h for traffic lights or railway crossings. I found an 80km/h speed camera on a railway

crossing at Bagshot on the Midland Highway (A300) between Shepparton and Elmore. To be fair, the crossing is not a good one. It has a bend on the crossing and limited vision due to lots of trees.

The Department of Transport in 2022 found that an estimated 370,000 motorists drove over regional level crossings without slowing down. In the five years leading up to 2022 there were 63 incidents reported at regional level crossings, including four serious collisions.

Editor's Comment: Even when there are no 80 signs?. This was news to me! Lindsay is backed up by the Transport Department's Speed Zoning Policy Edition 2 – December 2021, which states:

3.11 Railway level crossings in rural areas

At railway level crossings on rural roads, the maximum speed limit in the vicinity of the railway level crossing is 80 km/h. This position was adopted as part of the Victorian Government response to the recommendations of the 2008 Parliamentary Road Safety Committee inquiry into improving safety at level crossings.





Club member Noel passed away peacefully on 10 May aged 96 years. He joined the club in 1986.

Noel's parents lived in Shelford and he grew up on the family farm. He completed his secondary schooling at Geelong Tech and qualified as an electrical engineer at the Gordon. He boarded in West Geelong and rode his bike some 40 kms into Geelong from the farm.



Noel first worked for the SEC in Yarraville, commuting on the train. Later he worked as an electrical engineer for Dalgety's in Geelong and as a radio and TV repairman for Webb's Radio. (He was doing this in 1956, when TV first came to Australia.) In 1959 Noel started his own radio & TV repair business from home. In the 1970s the business moved to a shop at the southern end of Pakington St where it remained until Noel retired in 1992.

He used his skills to assist our Club at our then clubrooms in Norlane by setting up a TV for our use. When we moved to the present clubroom site at the Showgrounds, Noel provided a very suitable colour TV which we used until the large screen projector was acquired.

Noel was a self-confessed "collector" and enjoyed tinkering in his industrial shed in Moolap in his retirement years. He loved post war English cars
