The Willys Jeep

The Willys MB and the Ford GPW, both formally called the U.S. Army Truck, ½ ton, 4×4, Command Reconnaissance, commonly known as the Willys Jeep, Jeep, or jeep, and sometimes referred to by its Standard Army vehicle supply number G-503, were highly successful American off-road capable, light military utility vehicles.

Well over 600,000 were built to a single standardized design, for the United States and the Allied forces in World War II, from 1941 until 1945. This also made it (by its light weight) the world's first mass-produced four-wheel drive car, built in six-figure numbers.

October Guest Speaker

"Sweet Talked by a Beekeeper"



Stephen Davey, from the Geelong Beekeepers Club was our guest speaker at the October meeting. Stephen gave an interesting and entertaining talk about bee keeping and the challenges being faced, before leaving us with an invitation to take on a few hives ourselves.

Stephen introduced the topic by cleverly relating bees to some classic cars, giving away jars of sweetness to those who could answer his questions along the way.

flower nectar, pollen, babies (brood) and honey.

Honey is spare/excess nectar that the bees dehydrate, then cap the cells with a thin layer of wax.

In the mid 1800s Lorenzo Langstroth realized that if you provided a dark box with removable frames set a small distance apart, the bees would happily build their comb and store their honey within the frames.



Frames can be carefully

lifted out of the boxes to inspect the hive or extract honey and then inserted without upsetting the bees too much.

He showed this image then asked if anyone could identify any of the Bees.

Jim Coates took a stab and correctly identified the Bentley Flying B bonnet ornament - and scored the first jar of honey. The flying B

first appeared on the 1930 8 litre as an optional feature, priced at five guineas. The other bee was the European honey bee (Apis Melifera)

don't leave your windows down when parked because getting rid of a swarm on outside of the car is a lot easier than one on the inside." he said.



The difference between a swarm and a hive was that a swarm consisted of between 20,000 and 100,000 bees and a queen hunting, for a new home. Swarms settle temporarily on suitable surfaces and the bees cling together to keep warm while a

few scouts search for a more permanent home. Swarms are generally not aggressive as they don't have any honey or babies to protect or look after.

Stephen said there were three types of bees in a hive: firstly female worker bees – anywhere from 20,000 200,000. They do all the work, feeding, cleaning, comb building. They decide if the queen needs replacing.

Secondly the Queen bee which lays between 2000 and 2500 eggs a day in spring and summer.

Thirdly the boys (drones) whose sole job is to mate with other Queens (2 to 400-odd in a hive).

The incubation period of a worker bee was about 21 days. Queens took slightly less (16 days) and a drone slightly longer (24 days). The Queen generally laid in an oval pattern in the centre of the frame in the lower boxes and the worker bees store pollen and honey around the edges. The Queen lays tiny eggs about the size of a grain of rice and the eggs turn into a small grub/lavae after a couple of days. The worker bees cap the cells containing the grubs after about eight days and they hatch as bees after 21 days. In spring and summer worker bees only live for about 40 to 50 days.

So while the queen lays thousands of eggs a day and thousands of bees are hatching every day (after 21 days incubation), thousands are also dying.

Generally bees store honey above the brood in the upper boxes. Here is a frame almost completely full of honey capped over and ready for harvesting.



To extract the honey from the frames beekeepers uncap the wax covered cells, which can be done with a long knife for a few frames but commercial operators use a special uncapping machine.



Once uncapped frames are loaded into a spinning machine and spun inside a drum, flinging the honey out by centrifugal force. The honey drains to the bottom of the tank and is drawn off through a filter.

Natural honey can be extremely variable in colour and

taste depending on what floral resources the bees are finding. It may candy or crystallise over time. Gently warm crystallised honey in sunlight or a saucepan of warm water to return it to a runny consistency. Don't microwave honey.



Commercial or supermarket honey is a blend of multiple different honeys and corn syrup which is micro filtered so there are no minute particles of pollen common which limits the chance of crystallization.



The threat of the Varroa Mite



Bees are under threat from the recently-introduced Verroa Mite.

Until 18 months ago Australia was the only country in the world without the Varroa Mite. Sadly this is no longer the case. The mites infect a hive and live off young bee brood. Without aggressive management and treatment most hives will be killed within 12 months.

The mite arrived in New Zealand in the early 2000s and has regularly killed off about 50% of their hives.

Overseas experience has shown that Verroa almost completely wipes out all the feral or bush hives – all those that aren't managed by beekeeper. A lot of hives managed by beekeepers also die, meaning that there are dramatically fewer bees available to pollinate crops.

Verroa is the modern day equivalent of the rabbit, fox or cane toad.

"So we desperately need more beekeeper keepers who can help manage and nurture our dwindling bee population," Stephen said.

Servicing Electric Vehicles

Dealers typically generate significant profits from car-servicing contracts. However, that revenue is under threat because electric vehicles need a lot less servicing.

Tyres, wipers and fluids still need to be checked, but EVs do not have radiators or fuel lines to maintain nor spark plugs to replace. The article did not mention the engine oil and filters.

Programs are being run to help mechanics and dealers upskill to handle the new wave of electric vehicle customers.

Tasmanian Automotive Chamber of Commerce state manager Bruce McIntosh said it was "imperative" that everyone who worked on electric vehicles knew how to get the job done safely.

"We're dealing with systems that are upwards of 400 volts. So serious injury and, in some cases, electrocution are realities," he said.

"Training is needed for a range of professionals who deal with cars, from panel beaters, tow truck drivers to motor mechanics".

My warning: The orange wires carry the high voltages and need to be treated carefully.

While some sections of the auto industry are embracing change, Clive Attwater from the Tasmanian branch of the Australia Electric Vehicle Association, has seen some reluctance.

"Many of the mechanics that I've spoken to said, 'Hey, I'm in my 50s. Why would I bother to learn that new stuff now? I got enough to keep me busy till I retire'," he said.

We were saddened to learn that Clive Shaw passed away on 14 October 2023.

Clive was born in England in 1936 and grew up near Birmingham. He came to Australia in 1951.

As an accountant,
